Non prescription pain meds are not permitted while in Treatment.

<u>Toradol (Ketorolac) is acceptable</u> as it is a non-opioid with good pain relief, non-dependant for clients with documented chronic pain.

Also, Naproxen, VIMOVO, Arthrotec and Diclofenac generics are permitted substitutes.
